- Q: If you support increased state investment in subsidized child care for infants and toddlers at the campaign's recommended levels, how will you help the campaign expand child care for working families? OR If you do not support the proposed increases in access to child care, please explain why.

An aspiration goal would be to provide free high quality care for all, just as we provide k-12 public education. In this economy, it may take many decades to achieve. Even in this pandemic economy, there are opportunities for increased revenue in the commonwealth, among them FINALLY enacting a severance tax on shale gas and revenue from the legalized sale of adult use marijuana. In a different political climate, there may be a greater federal investment in early childhood care as well.

Q: Improved parenting skills, increased family economic self-sufficiency, improved maternal and child health and reducing abuse and neglect are just a few of the key benefits realized through evidence-based home visiting services. How do you view the needs and benefits of home visiting to families?

Home visits help families. At risk families, families with young parents, single parent families, families with parents with substance A: use disorders or mental wellness concerns, families with parents who are immigrants, families who struggle with food insecurity or health deficits. Home visits help parents be good parents. At times, home visits save lives.

Q: How will you support the expansion of state investment dollars to serve those in your district who can benefit from home visiting?

I will continue to work in partnership with county and state HHS to advocate for needed A: support.

Q: What would you do to increase payments to high-quality providers to improve their ability to retain qualified professionals?
