Question 1: The legislature is considering state funding for private school vouchers. As a school board member, would you agree or disagree with the idea of using public funds for private school vouchers?

1-It is my understanding that private and parochial school system function as quasi-public educational networks in parallel to the state system. The test for any school is whether the public has a common and equal right to use and benefit.

Question 2: The PA Senate is now considering legislation (HB 1422 that has passed through the House) that would modernize Pennsylvania's charter school law to ensure transparency, accountability and fiscal responsibility. As a school board member, would you agree or disagree with this approach to regulating charter schools?

2-HB1422 puts in affect transparency, accountability and fiscal responsibility in the establishment, governance and operation of charter schools. Charter and cyber schools are alternatives to public education. Alternatives without rules and regulations does not mean better. The public schools are required to be certified while states have given money to institutions that do not have the same requirements. Funds come directly from public school districts further straining their resources. Charter schools should be held by the same standards as any institution that receives public funds.

Question 3: Do you agree or disagree that working with teachers unions is necessary to address the teacher shortage crisis in our state?
